## Articles of Incorporation

Of

## The APTA <u>Federal</u> <u>Physical Therapy Section</u> of The American Physical Therapy Association. Inc.

١.

The name of the corporation is the <u>APTA</u> Federal <u>Physical Therapy Section of the American Physical Therapy Association</u>, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the <u>APTA</u> Federal <u>Physical Therapy Section</u>.

II.

This corporation shall **be a** nonprofit corporation **organization operated** under Chapter 1702 of the Ohio Revised Code governing nonprofit corporations.

III.

The APTA Federal Physical Therapy Section is organized exclusively for business, professional and trade association purposes, including, for such purposes, the promotion of quality health care by physical therapists in federal service and related activities and functions so as to qualify as an exempt organization under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law (the "Code").

### BYLAWS OF APTA FEDERAL PHYSICAL THERAPY SECTION OF THE AMERICAN PHYSICAL THERAPY ASSOCIATION, INC.

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The complete name of this organization is the <u>APTA</u> Federal <del>Physical Therapy</del> a Section of the American Physical Therapy Association, hereinafter referred to as the Section and the Association. For purposes of Ohio law and for any other purposes deemed necessary by the Corporation's Board of Directors, the name of this organization shall be the <u>APTA</u> Federal <del>Physical Therapy Section of the American Physical Therapy Association</del>, Inc.

### ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

The purpose of the Section shall be:

- 1. To provide a means by which Association members, employed by the Federal government and who work in the United States military, Department of Veterans Affairs, United States Public Health Service and other federal agencies, may meet, confer and promote collegial relationships.
- 2. To promote quality health care across the continuum of care for those served by therapists that practice physical therapy in the Federal government.

### ARTICLE III. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this Section shall be to:

- 1. Provide a communication system for physical therapists in the Federal government through professional meetings and periodic publications.
- 2. Make recommendations regarding policies that affect the physical therapy profession in the Federal government.
- 3. Stimulate a greater participation in the Association by physical therapists in the Federal government.
- 4. Provide opportunities for interchange of information and thereby improve treatment of patients in the Federal government facilities.
- 5. Provide continuing education programs to help improve the quality of health care in the Federal government.
- 6. Provide a mechanism for more active involvement in research for physical therapists in the Federal government.
- 7. Define a system of Service Representatives to facilitate transfer of information, communication, and feedback between Service divisions of the APTA Federal Physical Therapy Section of the Association.
- 8. Establish a mechanism for communication of section needs and goals between section members and the appropriate Federal officials.
- 9. Unify interpretation of federal regulations at the station level, maintaining high quality of care standards throughout the medical facilities of the Federal Government.
